STANDING ORDERS for use at DISTRICT CONVENTION

1. The rules of parliamentary procedure as laid down in Roberts Rules win apply, but the District Governor's decision on any point of order shall be final.
2. The conduct of the Convention Proceedings shall be under the Chairmanship of the District Governor, or, in his absence, such officer as shall act in accordance with the International Constitution. In all cases, should the Chairman not be the District Governor, these standing orders shall nonetheless apply as though the District Governor himself was in the Chair.
3.
 - (a). The District Governor shall have the absolute discretion for the length of time to be allowed for:
 - i) Presentation of reports
 - ii) Comments and questions from the floor
 - iii) Time allotted for the proposing of a Resolution or Amendment
 - iv) Time allotted for the seconding of a Resolution or Amendment
 - v) Discussion on any Resolution or Amendment.
 - vi) The right of reply by the Proposer of a Resolution or Amendment.

The District Governor will give an indication at the commencement of proceedings of the time which he proposes to allow for each. of the above categories, but may, upon informing Convention, at any time alter the period so allotted.

- (b). The District Governor shall have absolute discretion in terminating discussion on any subject and all speakers shall yield to the Chair when so directed.

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- (a). Written reports presented at Convention will be previously circulated to Club Secretaries and made available to Registered Delegates. District Officers will therefore only speak to their own reports to update information contained therein or to highlight matters as necessary.
 - (b). Any Lion wishing to speak on any Resolution or other matter of relevant business must use a microphone and must announce his name and the name of his Club before commencing to address Convention. Only Registered Delegates (or Registered Alternates) shall have the right to vote.
 - (c). Any Lion wishing to comment or ask questions on a report. may, with the permission of the District Governor, do so before Delegates vote on the adoption of that report.
 - (d). Each speaker must address the Chair only and conform to the time limit laid down by the District Governor at the commencement of proceedings. Other than the Chairman or the Lion moving a Resolution and exercising his right of reply, no Lion shall speak more than once on any one motion or subject, unless it shall be with the consent of the District Governor.
 - (e). Each Resolution or Amendment as circulated, must be formally moved by a representative of the Club which submitted that Resolution or Amendment to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee. All Resolutions and Amendments must be formally seconded. No Resolution or Amendment may be withdrawn without the consent of a majority of the voting Delegates at Convention.

STANDING ORDERS for use at DISTRICT CONVENTION (Continued)

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- (f). If there is no representative present to move a Resolution or Amendment, then the matter will fail by default.
However, the District Governor may, in his absolute discretion, call for any other Registered Delegate present formally to move and second such Resolution or Amendment so that debate and voting may take place.
- (g). The District Governor shall, in his absolute discretion, be able to accept an Emergency Resolution or Amendment for consideration by Convention if:
 - i) that Emergency Resolution or Amendment is submitted to him in writing before the commencement of the Opening Session of the Convention, AND
 - ii) in his opinion the Emergency Resolution or Amendment could not reasonably have been submitted to the Resolutions Chairman on or before the closing dates published for the receipt of the same, AND
 - iii) a majority of the voting delegates present at Convention consent to the Emergency Resolution or Amendment being so considered.

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- (a) Save as hereinafter provided, voting shall be by a show of Delegate (or where appropriate, Alternate) Cards, of those present and voting. The District Governor shall declare the result or order a count. If ten or more Delegates challenge the District Governor's declaration, the votes shall be counted.
- (b) Any Resolution or Amendment on a Constitutional matter must have the approval of a majority of at least two thirds of the Registered Delegates present in order that such a Resolution or Amendment shall become effective.
- (c) Any other Resolution or Amendment shall require the approval of a simple majority of registered Delegates present, to become effective.
- (d) In the event of a tied vote, the District Governor shall have a casting vote.
- (e) A minimum of thirty-five (35) Delegates in attendance at Convention shall constitute a quorum.
- (f) i) Voting for the election of District Governor shall be by way of secret written ballot amongst the Registered Delegates attending. Likewise, voting for the election to the office of Vice District Governor shall be by the way of secret written ballot amongst the Registered delegates attending.

ii) All elections shall be conducted by the Single Transferable Vote system as recommended from time to time by the Electoral Reform Society.

6. District Governor Team

6.1 District Governor – Chandra Kumar

Fellow Lions welcome to this 4th Cabinet meeting and the District Convention being held at the Reigate Manor Hotel.

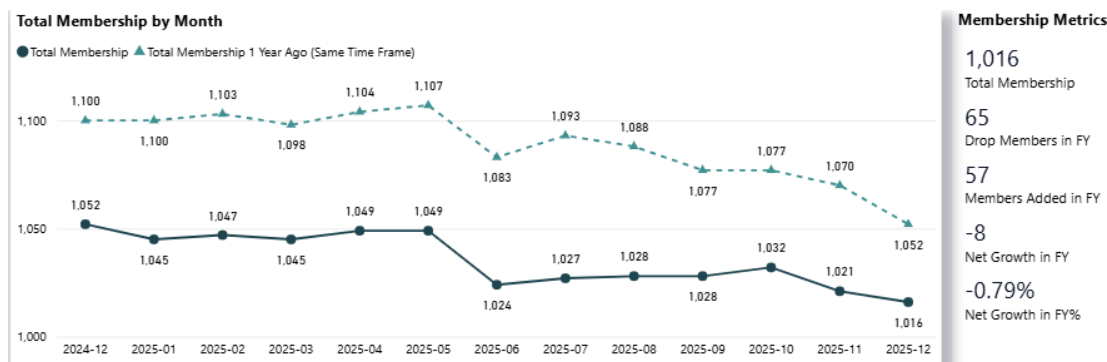

Introduction

Since my appointment as the new Childhood Cancer Officer in August, I am delighted to share the progress and achievements made in collaboration with MD Childhood Cancer Officer, Kelly-Marie Thomas. Together, we have worked to advance the Caps for Courage project, and I am pleased to report significant developments since I took on this role.

Progress with Caps for Courage

The Caps for Courage project has gained considerable momentum over recent months. Personally, I have sent at least 227 caps to the Caps for Courage Team. In addition, other clubs are now sending their caps directly, leading me to estimate that we have collectively sent a minimum of 300 caps so far.

Our efforts have also been well received abroad. The project was warmly welcomed by our twinned District 103 ID est at their District Convention. As a result, the Caps for Courage team has received a request for additional sample packs, demonstrating growing interest and support from our international partners.

LIBRA Appeal and Medical Outreach

During the recent LIBRA appeal visit, a sample pack and an introductory letter was given to the LIBRA medical team. This information was subsequently passed on to their Paediatric Cancer team, who have now requested a supply of caps to distribute to their young patients.

Ongoing Need for Caps

Despite these successes, the need remains great—over 7,000 caps are required to meet demand. I therefore urge clubs to get in touch with me at karen.carley@thanetlions.org.uk if you have local knitting groups or individuals willing to support this worthwhile cause. Please let me know the number of caps you are able to send, and I will provide you with the appropriate address for delivery.

Project Aim and How You Can Help

To remind everyone, the aim of Caps for Courage is straightforward yet impactful: to bring comfort, confidence, and a little joy to children experiencing hair loss as a result of cancer treatment. Each cap is lovingly handmade by volunteer knitters, crocheters, and sewers from across the country. We currently offer three different styles: Knitted, Beanie, and Scarf Hats. Patterns are available from me upon request, or you can find them on the MD Members website.

Ways to Get Involved

- **Donate Materials:** The Caps for Courage Team is always in need of soft, colourful fabrics, sewing supplies, and packaging materials. Any contributions from your club would be greatly appreciated and would help support our mission.
- **Make the Caps:** Caps can be knitted, crocheted, or sewn, and patterns are available for all styles. If you would like to host a Sewing Bee, please contact me or visit the Childhood Cancer section of the MD Members website for guidance and resources.
- **Sponsor a Batch:** You can help cover the cost of producing and distributing a batch of caps—whether it is for a region, a hospital, or a small group of children. Each handmade hat costs around £2 to produce. Payments can be made to MD, who will ensure the funds reach us.
- **Assist with Deliveries:** If you have members who travel regularly, live near hospitals, or already make items for charitable causes, we would welcome their help in delivering finished caps to children in need.

Looking Ahead

I am hopeful that I will be joined by the MD Officer at a display stand at the upcoming convention, where we will have sample packs available for viewing and further information.

The ROAR programme for 2025 has been successfully completed with 17 District SE Lions Clubs supporting 52 schools out of a national total of 133 supported schools. This was an excellent improvement in the numbers of schools- 20%- by our District which continues to lead the MD in this rewarding youth programme. Each school was supported by its local Lions Club which, in most cases, helped with the launch and the judging of the ideas to find each school winners. Three judging teams were appointed to identify the best ideas from the school winners and DG Chandra chose our overall winner.

The winning SE school was again Westham and Pevensey Primary, for the second consecutive year, supported by Hailsham Lions. The other selected schools were Our Lady at Lourdes School supported by Rottingdean and Saltdean LC and Rudgwick School supported by Billingshurst LC. Uckfield LC also ran it's 'Mini-ROAR' event for 9 schools attended by the High Sheriff of East Sussex and the Uckfield Mayor bringing public attention to our Lions youth work

The ROAR programme engaged over 25,000 children of which over 9000 children were in the South-East. Evidence continues to increase that involvement in ROAR facilitates greater community integration and brings big advantages to children, to schools and to Lions. SE Lions Clubs are clearly recognising this, and we encourage all Clubs to participate and appreciate the benefits for themselves.

Last December communications have been sent out to Clubs about the Youth Camps and Exchange with a request to contribute to the program by sponsoring UK students to take part and to go abroad during summer 2026-2027. The clubs that are invited to select the candidates and the district Officer will provide the application form to share with the MD. However so far no request of information or further details has been received from the Clubs. More information on how to select students for the program can be asked from paolofurlan@105se.org.

- Request has been spread around about the hosting families for the Youth Exchange. Between the 5th of August 2026 and the 10th August 2026 after the staying in the Camp in Loughborough, a staying in local families is foreseen for the young participants. 2-3 hosting families are requested from the MD to our district. Being a hosting family is a Lions' Service since the '60s and its importance for reaching our statutory goal of promoting a spirit of understanding among the people of the world is understated. There was a tour of the refurbished wards assisted by LIBRA. All in all a great success. We had good feedback from the Clubs who came along on the visit.

1. Gene discovery. Our previous discovery has resulted in the first gene-editing therapy for the disease (Casgevy, editing the gene BCL11A). Additional discovery will be based on an analysis of UK Biobank, containing data for 1 million human subjects. Continuing our access would cost £3,500 per year, i.e. £7,000 for two years' access.
2. Dissecting the biology of 'F cells. This type of red blood cells is protected from the effects of sickle mutation. We want to know how and when they arise. I would like to ask LIBRA to fund reagent and research service cost for a researcher joining our lab for a year from Italy, Dr Daniele Panzieri. Presently, only his salary is covered. £13,000 research funds for Daniele would cover his lab expenses here. This would be for: - £2,000 for magnetic beads and other reagents to isolate cells from human samples. - £8,000 generating two single-cell transcriptome datasets (microfluidic cartridges, kits, next generation sequencing cost). - £3,000 for reagents (flow cytometry, antibodies, gene probes, reagent kits) to develop a new method (FISH-FLOW) to measure F cells in patients. A total of £20,000 was agreed.

We still await Rob Lewis's costings for a further ward refurbishment and essential equipment needed.

Professor Ghulam Mufti request:

We agreed £4,500 for research support for 2 young scientists in regard to aplastic anaemia for one year to do lab testing on the blood of patients treated with expanded TREG cells.

The current newsletter has been circulated.

PR support is being given to Lion Trevor Hull who is our LIBRA representative for District CE for his fundraising walk at CE's convention in March at Worksop.

We are delighted to welcome Consultant Nurse Michelle Kenyon to Convention who will be giving us a talk on her holistic emphasis on healthcare within the haematology unit.

Our PR consultant Katie has gained 2 patient stories which will be reported in the next newsletter.

On behalf of the Trustees, we thank all the Clubs for their wonderful support as we have now reached our goal for the *Going for Gold* appeal.

As soon as we have detail of the next ward refurbishment project, we will announce the new LIBRA appeal project.

Report to 105SE Convention February 2026

A Message from Air Ambulance Kent Surrey and Sussex (KSS)

"Thank you to all the members of the South East Lions for all of the support that you have given to KSS over the last year. Through the fundraising efforts of the local clubs, you have generously funded seven new video laryngoscopes, 13 new kit bag systems and have recently completed your fundraising for our new Rapid Response Vehicle.

Your support has allowed our crew to have access to the most up to date and high spec equipment to give our patients the best possible care at scene. Your members have also kindly succeeded in raising the £53K needed to purchase our next Rapid Response Vehicle (RRV) meaning when circumstances prevent us from flying, we can still provide lifesaving care by road.

Last year we were called to 3,126 missions and treated 1,801 patients across our communities. We continue to see an increase in medical emergencies (32%) as the leading type of mission we're called to, followed by road traffic collisions (29%) and accidental emergencies (18%). You not only enable us to be there for patients in their darkest hour but also help us to innovate for the good of our future patients. We can't

do it without the South East Lions and hope you take pride in being a part of the KSS family.”

Our Next Joint Project with KSS

All Weather Flying by Point In Space Navigation (PinS)

A vital addition to the KSS AW169 helicopter that will help KSS fly more and help save more lives

We started our formal partnership with KSS in 2012 by providing the funding to act as a catalyst to the creation of the KSS night flying capability, and many of our joint projects since have also been significantly innovative. Now we have the chance to support KSS's next big innovation to introduce all weather flying by Point in Space (PinS) navigation to fly when they currently cannot.

Why PinS is Needed

KSS helicopters are equipped with a top-of-the-range digital cockpit containing advanced GPS and autopilot, enabling them to fly when visibility is near zero. However, regulatory visual flight rules mean pilots must currently be able to see 3,000m and clouds must be above 500ft. Last year, poor weather affected the aircraft availability by around 15%, and in such poor weather KSS must use the much slower service offered by their rapid response vehicles (RRVs) to get the medical crews to patients and then the patients to hospital.

All weather flying will be a hugely important development for the KSS service. With PinS they could reach 150 more patients a year by air, thus giving those patients the best care at the very earliest opportunity.

RRVs will remain essential for local missions, those within 10 minutes from base in the day and 25 minutes at night, and those in the most severe weather conditions such as freezing rain and thick fog.

How All Weather Flying Will Work

PinS is utilised by KSS's peers at the Norsk Luftambulans in Norway but would be a first in the UK. To fly using PinS, the aircraft's GPS and autopilot need to follow pre-set routes in the sky to navigate safely in and out of key locations, such as hospital helipads, airports or other carefully selected locations. These routes are being designed by working alongside aviation technology experts at PildoLabs Wessex, who have extensive experience implementing this type of flight. The KSS helicopter will use its GPS safely to identify and follow the pre-set flight path into a specific site. This could be the intended final destination, or it could be a point at which the weather is clear, allowing onward flight by conventional means.

As you can imagine, all such routes require approval from both the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) and Department for Transport, and KSS has worked extensively with both agencies on a comprehensive plan to use PinS. They have mapped precise routes into key locations at Ashford, Rochester Airport, Redhill Aerodrome, King's College Hospital London and the Royal County Hospital Brighton. These sites are currently being assessed via the CAA's seven-stage Airspace Change Process. Once approved, KSS will comprehensively test each approach to ensure it is safe. They intend to be transporting their first patients using PinS very soon now, and further routes will be developed over time as proves necessary.

Looking ahead, the KSS goal is to extend all weather flying by PinS across our entire service area, including the longest route to Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother Hospital in Margate, Kent. The aircraft modifications proposed below is essential to achieving this goal and to the envisioned advancement in KSS's lifesaving work.

Where We Lions Come In

PinS flying can mean longer journey distances. Therefore, in order to meet CAA requirements as to maximum flight time capabilities, a modification is required to the aircraft. We have been asked to fund this modification to one of the helicopters at a cost of £120,000, spread over two years, extending flying time by more than 30 minutes and advancing KSS flying capabilities by up to 15%. This would enable KSS to reach an extra 150 patients per year by helicopter and greatly increasing their ability to give the best possible patient care.

Please Support this Project All You Can

Without us, KSS cannot achieve all weather flying and be there for more patients when every second counts. So, to recognise such a significant contribution, KSS will include our Lions logo on the helicopter.

Please support this latest initiative all you can by sending donations to the District Charities Treasurer in the normal way, clearly marked "Air Ambulance".

Our Work with the Air Ambulance Continues to Grow

I make no apology for repeating the reasons for our support for KSS. The life-saving service they provide is vital to the well-being of all people in our area, and its objectives are in total alignment with our own. Through our partnership with KSS, we can identify exactly what wonderful results our support produces, and how many lives it saves. We can truly say:

10.3 District Treasurer – Howard Lee Administration Accounts

My predecessor as District Treasurer, PDG David Butler, has prepared the accounts for the administration funds run by the District for the year ended 30 June 2025. These accounts were approved by our District Cabinet on 5 October 2025 and have been independently examined (thanks to Roger Hope of Sevenoaks Lions Club). A copy is available on request. Accounts for the District Convention for 2025 will be reported on separately by District Convention Chairman David Burstow.

Members' dues payments for the first half of this Lions' year have been received from all Clubs and the appropriate amounts forwarded on to LCI and MD. Requests for payments for District and MD dues together with details of the amounts requested by LCI for the second half of the Lions' year will be sent to all clubs in early January.

It is a requirement of the Multiple District Constitution that all clubs file their annual financial statements with their District Treasurer by 31 December following the year end. I thank those 18 club treasurers who have so far sent me their clubs statements for the year to 30 June 2025 and would encourage all others to do so as soon as possible.

A meeting of the District Finance Committee has been held to review the district admin finances, to draw up a draft budget for 2026/27 for Cabinet approval and to recommend the dues resolution for Cabinet to propose to the next Convention. In doing so, the committee considered the following points as paramount:

- Despite significant savings on twinning hosting, we are budgeted in 2025/26 for the largest deficit for many years. Every effort should be made to minimise the deficits going forward.
- Many of our members constantly complain about the dues. We had a large jump two years ago, and District 105SE dues are the highest in the MD. We should aim to keep them the same for as long as possible.
- Our membership for this year to date is OK, but we face ongoing trends of net losses. Whilst working for the best, we must prepare for the worst. The committee suggested we budget for 940 as at 1 July 2025 and 900 as at 31 December 2025.
- In the budget as drafted, we are still showing a deficit of £2,550. At this rate, we will have used up the available reserves in another five years. **If we wanted to present a balanced budget, the dues proposal would have to be to increase by £3 to £15.50 per head.**

At its meeting on 7 December, Cabinet agreed the budget for 2026/27 as per attached and agreed to propose to Convention that the dues remain at £12.50 per member for that year. The necessary resolution is contained in the relevant document.

Another meeting of the Finance Committee will be held in the Spring to review the District's Procedures for Financial Governance and prepare recommended changes for Cabinet's consideration.

Charity Accounts

The Financial Statements of the Lions Clubs International District 105SE Foundation ("the Foundation") for the year to 30 June 2025 have been approved by the Trustees and have undergone independent examination by a professional firm of chartered accountants. Copies are available on request.

Since the last Convention, the Trustees of the Foundation have made three grants of £300 each to diabetes screening programmes held by Clubs. The Foundation has funds available for grant applications from Clubs in the district:

- to provide aid to those in need in or from the countries around Belarus,
- for diabetes screening and awareness in the community, and
- for the relief of distress within the District caused by natural disasters.

If your Club has need of assistance from these funds, please contact me for details.

In addition, during the last year the Trustees also supported three schools in the ROAR 2025 competition, but without individual Club sponsorship.

There is a significant call for the SE Foundation to provide more funding support to Clubs in the District, but this will require the accumulation of unrestricted funds. To this end, an appeal for general donations has been sent out to all clubs, and I would ask for as much support as your club can manage for this appeal.

Also, to this end, the Foundation has set up a 200 Club. Members, their family and their friends are invited to subscribe for as many numbers as they wish at £2 per number per month. Monthly prize draws will be held, with a special bumper prize at Convention. Copies of the Rules and Application Forms will be available at Convention and can also be obtained from me.

PDG Lion Tom Berry and his team continue to do great work developing the facilities and use of the Lions Giving website. No doubt Tom will report in more detail elsewhere. However, there are costs involved, and the Trustees of the Foundation are now exercised in the consideration of how best to meet the costs concerned. The best way for Clubs in the District to support this excellent work is to make full use of the facilities offered by Lions Giving, so please contact me for full details.

12.1 International Relations Officer (IRO) – Steve Carley

Since July this year, I have attended our twinned District 105 EST convention in October and attended 2 online Metropolitan Alliance Zoom meetings. At all these meetings our friends in Germany and France have confirmed they still want to keep our twinning, but with no financial costs to each District for hotel or social event costs. At Cabinet, it has been confirmed that we will remain twinned with both.

Unfortunately, our friends from France cannot attend our convention this year, due to a clash of other important events they have to attend, but my fellow IRO from District 111MN Andreas, will be attending. This means there won't be a formal twinning meeting at Reigate, but it is hoped that there will be one at our 2027 Convention straight after our Cabinet meeting.

In April I will be representing our District Governor and District at 111MN's Convention in Germany and in June we will have our in-person day in Luxembourg sharing how each District runs Service projects under LCI's key areas, which could provide useful ideas for our District.

For example, 111MN will share how they are running a Diabetes project for children with Type 1 diabetes focusing on how to eat, how to live with Type 1 diabetes. Children apply to join this event. I have asked if she can share any information on the event, which may be useful for our clubs to replicate.

At the French Convention I also presented the Caps for Courage project to the delegates, which was well received and at the end of the meeting some Lions asked for more details. Our MD Childhood Cancer officer Kelly-Marie has since received a request from France clubs for more sample packs.

13. Zone Chairman Team

13.1 Zone 1A Chairman – Pete Dilloway

Clubs located in Zone 1A: Bognor Regis, Chichester, Lancing and Sompting, Littlehampton and District, Midhurst, Selsey and District, Southbourne (West Sussex), Worthing.

Despite my not being located within Zone 1A, I have agreed to take on the zone Chairman role for this year due to there being no one available from within the zone. To date my engagement with clubs in the zone has been limited to requests by email and telephone including the club reports for this cabinet report. I have also been liaising with individual clubs regarding questions raised by the club and issues relating to the club. Some of the clubs have been successful in attracting new members.

All clubs are active, despite some have limited membership. They have all been particularly busy in the runup to Christmas and have plans in place for fundraising and service activities. I have represented LCI at the charter dinner of Worthing Lions and am also aiming to attend many of the charters or socials of the other clubs in the zone if possible.

While I am intending to hold zone meetings, in the remainder of the year, at present specific dates have not yet been established. It is likely that the meetings will consist of a mixture of physical in person meeting at a suitable location in the zone and virtual meetings

My objectives for the year are

1. Develop and maintain contact and work with the zone clubs to provide advice, support & assistance when needed, to help increase membership and address any issues that arise
2. Explore with clubs the opportunity for running Lions Awareness events within the zone and new members information/orientation events
3. Attend at least one Business meeting of all clubs within the Zone during the year.
4. Attend all club Charters within the Zone where able.
5. To encourage collaboration between the clubs including participation in cross zone activities such as the Zone meetings, projects and socials.
6. Encourage and work with clubs to identify potential future leaders for the zone.
7. Explore potential opportunities for establishing new clubs or Club branches within the zone

13.2 Zone 1B Chairman – Claudine Rogers

Clubs in Zone 1B include Adur East, Billingshurst, Brighton, Burgess Hill, Haywards Heath, Horsham and Rottingdean & Saltdean. Club visits are continuing into 2026. Following its success in 2025, a further Zone Social of Pub Skittles in Henfield is planned for Spring/Summer. It is hoped that Members from each Club will attend, strengthening Zone relationships. The total number of Members across all Clubs is 147 (down from 159 last year).

Adur East continues to be a very active Club. With an extensive array of service & social activities, Members continue to run annual events such as Senior's Tea Socials, Car Boots, a monthly Market Stall and their hugely popular Family Fun Day. Monthly donations are made to two local Foodbanks, who also benefit from Wencelas payments. A Hugely successful Melanoma Screening event took place in October and in most recent weeks they have run numerous festive community activities, such as static collections at their local Tesco/ M&S atrium (with Santa giving out free toys), a week of Sleigh street collecting (with Santa giving out free sweets), and also a Santa's Grotto, run over five days. Their largest event for 2026 will once again be their annual Family Fun Day, to be held on 7th June (25 Members).

R&S continue to run, and be involved in large annual events, such as the Rottingdean Fayre & the Saltdean Gala. Christmas activities included their famous Highway Robbery, Senior's Christmas Lunches, a very successful (indoor) Christmas Fair and also the provision of food/gift hampers for the needy. In 2026, R&S Lions will once again be running their fabulous Bar at Adur East's Family Fun Day. Their biggest challenge for 2026 is succession planning & having Members step up to lead on their activities. (15 Members).

Brighton Lions continue to run a whole host of regular activities, covering events such as bingo, book fairs, crafting sessions and fortnightly donations/deliveries to 24 local Foodbanks. December also saw their annual Christmas toy delivery to the Royal Alexandra Children's Hospital, and Christmas food deliveries to both Foodbanks and the local MS Center. They believe their biggest challenge remains increasing membership. (16 Members)

Sadly, Haywards Heath Lions has an ongoing struggle with membership. However, they continue to help local families in their community with funds resulting from their hugely successful Swimarathon. Over Christmas they have a Waitress collection planned, and also hope to increase their publicity in the local area. Their biggest challenge for 2026 remains increasing membership. (5 Members)

Horsham continue to run a wide variety of events covering service and fundraising including their annual fundraiser at the Roffey Club, where their Business Meeting is held, raising almost £3,000 for the KSS Air Ambulance. To help local families for Christmas, they presented £3,300 worth of vouchers to Saxon Weald, who provide homes for the needy. They are already busy planning for their annual Swimarathon, being held in March 2026 at the Pavilions In The Park. (17 Members).

Billingshurst Lions are a very healthy Club, with excellent links to their community. Their bookshop open 5 days a week, provides a continual stream of potential new-members (not to mention income)). Most recently they have also run a pop-up bookshop within Billingshurst Starbucks. Over the Christmas period, Members were busy on their annual Santa Tours & the Club also provided Christmas Hampers to local families in need. They have also begun working with Rotary on a new Christmas Tree Recycling project. They

envisage their biggest challenge for 2026 will be getting into schools to run the new Vision Screening Project. (34 Members).

Burgess Hill, as the largest Club in the Zone, continue to make great strides in serving their community. Their most recent PSA testing event resulted in 1,144 men being screened for prostate cancer, together with £14,225 being received in donations (plus gift aid)! They routinely partner with local business and the Town Council in their annual Search for a Star Competition. The Club is also proud of achieving 32 candidates for the Young Leaders In Service Program. At Christmas, in conjunction with Rotary, the Town Council and Market Place Shopping Centre, they ran a free Santa's Grotto, giving out sweets and gifts to children in need. One of their biggest challenges for the remainder of the year will be in relation to the Vision Screening Project, as the only Member trained on its use, its currently 'at large'. (35 Members).

The Zone Clubs are also supporting a large Zone Project, running the Patcham Duck Fayre (a huge community Fayre in Patcham, Brighton). This follows the existing Association reaching out to Lions for assistance. Zone Chair Claudine will be leading the project with assistance from many (if not all) of the Zone Clubs.
